
## Keep 'em Flyin' – My Dad's Service in the US Army Air Corp – People, Planes & Postcards

After Luzon...? My dad (Michael J. Ricciardi) in military dress (Staff Sergeant), note 6<sup>th</sup> Air Services Group (Army Air Forces) tour of duty signage in background (Guadalcanal, etc.). Dad was assigned to the Army Air Core and trained as an airplane mechanic.



Brochure Cover- Napier Field, Dotham, Alabama – "The purpose of the field is to train cadets in all phases of advanced flying of single-motored planes....night flying, formation flying, blind flying, gunnery practice, navigation, altitude flying. This field marks the final stage of a cadet's training, and it is here that he is awarded the coveted "wings". Note "Gruffie", the Napier Filed mascot, on cover, lower right.









