
Keep 'em Flyin' – My Dad's WWII Service in the US Army Air Corp – People, Planes & Postcards

Brochure Cover- Napier Field, Dotham, Alabama – "The purpose of the field is to train cadets in all phases of advanced flying of single-motored planes...night flying, formation flying, blind flying, gunnery practice, navigation, altitude flying. This field marks the final stage of a cadet's training, and it is here that he is awarded the coveted "wings". Note "Gruffie" - the Napier Filed mascot, on cover, lower right.

Mike Ricciardi' (my dad was promoted before shipping out). The third image is of the front side of 2nd post card.




